


Physical Distancing.

If you are healthy, it is OK to go outside as long as you keep a safe distance from others.



What's Next?	 Many questions have come up regarding how long these restrictions will be in place. In short, no one knows. However, what the experts point out is that if everyone complies with the Public Health Orders we may begin to see some relaxing of the orders in three to four weeks. On April 13, Chief Medical Officer Dr Hinshaw indicated these restrictions will stay in place for some time. The Alberta Public Health Order will remain in effect until rescinded by the Chief Medical Officer of Health.
Maximum Gathering Size	 Update as of March 27: Public and private gatherings of more than 15 people in one room are prohibited. Physical distancing of two-meter (6 ft.) distance between people must be maintained.
Essential Services: Barns, Shops, and On-Farm Stores	Businesses and services on the essential services list, such as agriculture production and slaughter plants, can continue to provide services at locations accessible to the public, but they must have proper risk mitigation measures in place, such as sanitation stations and appropriate distancing between customers. Practice two-metre (6 ft.) physical distancing between people in the workplace. At the first sign of a cough or fever, self-isolate for 14 days. Prohibit people from coming to work sick. Maintain sanitation stations.
Non-Medical Masks	Wearing a non-medical mask, even when you are without symptoms, is an additional measure you can take to protect others around you, especially where physical distancing can't be maintained. Such as when shopping or during meat processing or dishing food in <i>Kuchel</i> .
Hutterian Safety Council (HSC) - Roles and Responsibilities	 The HSC's role is to disseminate reliable information to Hutterite Communities from governmental sources. HSC mediates between communities and Public Health Inspectors to find non-police solutions whenever complaints are filed against Hutterite Communities. HSC does NOT file complaints.
Enforcement Information	 Under the Public Health Act, RCMP are able to issue tickets to enforce COVID-19 Public Health Orders. Individuals face the following consequences: Fines of \$1,000 per occurrence. More serious violations face fines of up to \$100,000 for a first offence and up to \$500,000 for subsequent offences. Violating any instructions provided to you when you entered Canada could lead to up to 6 months in prison and/or \$750,000 in fines. Alberta Health Services Public Health are now capturing all public health complaints and are forwarding them to Law Enforcement. Infections and deaths caused by breaching any Public Health Orders is now an offence and punishable by law.
